What A Feeling!

Chelmsford Gang Show 2008

Following on from last year's emotional 50th anniversary, Chelmsford Gang Show proved this year that it's still ticking all the boxes. Ralph Reader songs? Check. Crest of a wave? Check. Red scarves? Check. Men in drag enjoying themselves too much? Checkmate. With performances inspired by the seemingly omnipresent High School Musical, The Sound of Music, Take That and Status Quo, Chelmsford Gang Show had something to offer everyone from the youngest Beaver to the oldest Fellowship member.

The opening number 'We're All In This Together' quite aptly summarises the spirit of the whole Gang, whether being muttered in a rather nervous manner among the Musical and Artistic Directors as we fail once again to perfect the seemingly innocuous 'step-click, step-click!' (oh it is harder than it looks), or taken in the sense of Scouting companionship and solidarity so manifest in the Chelmsford Gang. We were upstaged once again by the Mini-Gang, before what is undoubtedly many people's favourite part of the show, the Ralph Reader number, which included a Ralph song with a commuting theme, to which much of our audience could doubtlessly relate. We can but hope we did our founder's self-scribed tunes the justice they deserve. Moving swiftly on through the Cities number, including a solo by Cathy Nicholls and a beautiful guitar-led rendition of 'Streets of London' to the Act I finale, a popular Status Quo number featuring the songs: 'Whatever you Want', 'Down Down' and 'Rocking All Over The World', in which the whole cast took to the stage to perform this classic.

The Gang opened Act II with probably the most popular item in the 51st show: 'D'oh!' – or, in other words, songs from the musical 'The Sound of Music'. Opened by a solo performance of 'The Hills Are Alive' by Lottie Valks of Tsumani ESU, perhaps even her considerable vocal talent was somewhat surprisingly surpassed by the performance of both 'Pete the Deer' and 'Gary the Goat'. Although the Gang Show Gazette proclaimed 'heavy petting **was** okay', their time in the limelight was cut tragically short as they were confined to the stage after they caused near riots in the audience (uncontrollable, those Beavers). Despite being a hard act to follow, the remainder of Act II included a cleverly staged drag act somewhat aptly entitled 'Man, I Feel Like A Woman'. A very successful number indeed, certainly as half the audience failed to recognise some dancers were male, while the other half wondered how their legs could look that good in fishnets!

Traditionally finishing with all of the Gang onstage in impeccable uniform and the proudly worn red Gang Show scarves, singing 'Crest of a Wave' which is doubtlessly Ralph Reader's most well-loved song, Chelmsford Gang Show rounded off the show with a bang; finally ending on an upbeat rendition of the titular 'What A Feeling!'. And what a feeling indeed – entirely performed, and more importantly artistically directed, costumed and supported by members of Scouting and Guiding, Chelmsford Gang Show and Gang Shows all around the country are a symbol of what it means to be a Scout or a Guide. This year's show proved in exceptional style that there will be no slowing down following last year's landmark, and all that is left to say is bring on the next 50 years!

Both of these projects were part of service tasks required for badge work.

The new chapel was dedicated by Malcolm Treacher in February and is available for everyone to use as a place of quiet and reflection.

If you haven't been to Riffhams this year, why not? It's the perfect place to put into practice all those traditional Scouting skills. You have missed the bluebells now but there is always plenty of wildlife to see. We have a permanent orienteering course set up plus a nature trail and pioneering poles for hire. A charcoal BBQ is also available. Later this year the kitchen is due for a rebuild and the new design will offer a bit more flexibility for central catering.

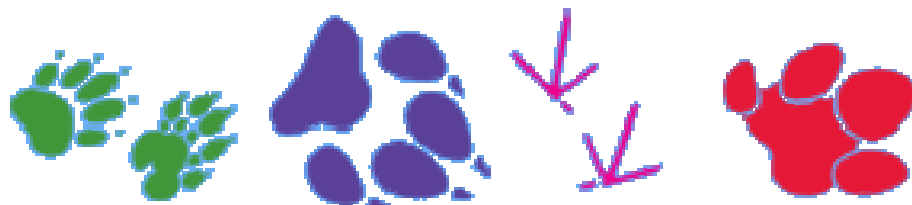

Starting in Mayland, the 10 teams had to make their way to the overnight stop at Woodham Ferrers Scout HQ, mainly using the St Peter's Way footpath, where they had to set up camp and cook dinner for themselves. After breakfast the following morning they packed everything back into their rucksacks and walked a further 7 miles to East Hanningfield.

HUGE congratulations to all the Scouts that took part and completed this extremely tough challenge.

The annual cooking competition held on the 14th June was made a little tougher this year by making all the teams cook on open fires at Riffhams. The teams were judged on teamwork, originality, hygiene and presentation as well as the quality of their meals. The young chefs rose to the challenge and, although they found it a little harder to cook on their unregulated fires, all teams managed to deliver a 3-course (although slightly charred) for the judges to taste test.

The winning team for 2008 was from Bicknacre Priory, who for their main meal served Teriyaki Salmon and vegetables. 'Yum' I hear you say!
